THE BLAIR-COCHRANE CONNECTION

The name Cochrane originates from the "five-merk" lands of Coueran, Cochrane, near Paisley in Renfrewshire though some suggest that some MacEacherns who removed to the Lowlands adopted the name Cochrane as a means of concealing their origins. Its affinity to the Irish Corcoran is also suggestive of a link. The first Cochrane recorded in Scotland was one Waldeve de Coveran who witnessed a charter in favour of the 5th Earl of Menteith in 1262. In 1456, Robert Cochrane of Cochrane resigned the lands of Cochrane to his successor, Allan who received a charter of them from James II. Edward Cochrane (perhaps of this family) was declared innocent of having any part in the detention of King James III in Edinburgh Castle in 1482. **The last Cochrane of that ilk left only a daughter, Elizabeth who married**

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Blair who took his wife's name and estates. Their son Sir William Cochrane was created 1st Earl of Dundonald in 1669. After the death of the 7th Earl the descendants of Sir William's second son became the Earls. Thomas, the 10th Earl (1775-1860) was the most celebrated chief of the Cochranes and is generally known as Lord Cochrane. He joined the navy at 18 years and became famous when in command of a brig he captured a Spanish frigate, whose crew outnumbered his by six-to-one, with 32 heavy guns. He followed this feat by defending Trinidad Castle against the French in 1808. He was returned to Parliament and was outspoken on the Admiralty and the commander-in-chief. He was deprived of his position and seat in government when he was prosecuted wrongly for fraud. In 1817 the Chileans invited him to command their navy in the attempt to secure independence which he succeeded in doing. He followed by helping the Brazilians and the Greeks against the Turks. He was at last reinstated and in 1854 was made Rear Admiral. He also promoted the use of steam propelled warships while his continued attacks on the incompetence and navy hierarchy led to far-reaching reforms. Dundonald Castle in Kyle built by the Stewarts in the 12th century was bought by the Cochranes in the 17th century. The Cochrane tartan was officially approved by the 14th Earl of Dundonald and Chief of the Cochranes, which removed the earlier doubts that the sett was incorrect.

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The Blair-Scott Connection

Letter from Sir Walter Scott to Hugh Scott of Harden, 30 Dec 1828

Allen,

I mentioned in a previous paper that Dominique Marie François Rene Galouzeau de Villepin, the Prime minister of France, traces his lineage from Alexander Blair (1563c- 1615c), a younger son of Alexander Blair of Balthayock and his first wife Janet Ogilvy. Through exchange of information with Patrick de Villepin, their family historian, I have been able to amend and add to the book "The Blairs of Balthayock and their Cadets" under the section "Blair Family in France."

Patrick raised a question regarding the relationship between Sir Walter Scott and the Blairs of Balthayock, as one of his forebears learned there was a link. Researching that, I discovered that in 1828 Monsr. Dommartin had written from France to his friend Hugh Scott of Harden in respect of his Blair forebears. Hugh Scott raised this with his famous kinsman, Sir Walter Scott of Abbotsford. This resulted in the reply written on 30 December 1828.

Therein, Sir Walter draws on the work of Sir Robert Douglas and thus encounters the errors made in "The Scottish Baronage" where Douglas was unaware of the first marriage of Alexander Blair of Balthayock and several sons from it. The "Baronage" thus produced an erroneous family tree based solely on the youngest sons by the second marriage, which leads to Scott noting differences between the "Baronage" and the French version.

Scott starts by debating the origins of the family, suggests that it may have derived from Blair in Fife and notes that there was a family association with Constantine of Lochore back in the 13th century. I would dispute that geographic link but in the "Balthayock " book, I had noted the Constantine link. I have a hypothesis, yet to expound, which may explain the Blair / Constantine relationship through the Earl Waldeve. (Will leave that for another day).

At the end of his letter, Sir Walter Scott suddenly reveals that there was a close family link between his and the Blair of Balthayock family. It would seem that his mother knew the relationship but so far, I have not discovered the actual link.

Those on the Clan Blair Society visit to Scotland in 2006 will recall that they visited Abbotsford and may even have seen there the desk at which Sir Walter Scott penned the letter on the Blairs of Balthayock.

Letter from Sir Walter Scott to Hugh Scott of Harden:

My Dear Sir, 30 Dec 1828,

A much slighter motive than a wish to obey your commands and oblige a friend of yours will at any time involve me in such a genealogical enquiry as you desire me to make respecting the families of the Blairs; so I send a few observations, which may be authenticated by further genealogical researches should Monsr. Dommartin require such to be made.

The word Blair signifies originally Battle or rather field of Battle and many places in Scotland are so called. These like other local designations were assumed by the person who lived there and thus became by degrees converted into family surnames. But the numerous families named Blair are generally derived by Genealogists from one or other of two families namely either from Blair of Blair in Ayrshire or from that of Blair of Balthayock in Perthshire, Angus, and the North of Scotland.

These two families had each a number of collateral relations and descendants who owned them for their Chiefs but they disputed violently with each other which of them ought to be acknowledged as the Chief of the whole tribe of Blair.

As these two families had subsisted independently of each other for so many generations there was no means of establishing which House was the more honorable or ancient so that James VI at length decided the controversy by directing that the age of the Representatives of Blair of Blair and Blair of Balthayock should determine the precedence for

the time.

It appears that the branch of the family from which Monsr Dommartin descends comes from the family of Balthayock. This family seems to have attained distinction about the year 1214. I suspect from circumstances that the Blair from which this family took their surname was Blair in Kinrossshire called Blair-Adam including another property also called Blair, the name of Blair or Battle given to this domain was from the attack of the Caledonians upon the Ninth Legion, which they nearly destroyed.

Great part of the action was fought on Lochore (now the property of my daughter-in-law and son) and in confirmation of supporting this to have been the original seat of the Blairs, I observe that Constantine de Lochore was nearly connected with the family. But whether the Blairs derived their name from that identical place or from another of the same name they became Lairds of Balthayock about 1393 and made ever after a distinguished figure under that title.

The whole genealogy of the race may be found in Douglass's Scottish Baronage which is our only authority or nearly so upon such subjects, that author gives from the archives of the family of Balthayock the following account of the origin of the families who occur in France. Alexander Blair of Balthayock succeeded to the Lands *and* Barony of Balthayock in 1568. He married Elizabeth daughter of Sir Laurence Mercer of Aldie (a family of distinction) by whom according to Douglas, had three sons, Laurence, Thomas and Patrick.

The first Laurence succeeded to his Father's estate. The Third Patrick was the ancestor of the Blairs of Pittendreich *and* other families, the passage concerning the second Thomas: I copy at length

"Second Thomas who went to France in the reign of James VI of Scotland where he settled and married a Lady of rank and distinction whose posterity have flourished with lustre in that Kingdom ever since *and* of whom are descended several families which now make a considerable figure. – **One**

settled at Bearn whose representative is an officer in the army and was in the regiment of Fitz James, another is settled at Mentz whose representative is now a counsellor of that town and hath several brothers officers of rank in the army, and Mr De Blair, representative of a third branch settled at Paris is now Master of Requests and Intendant of Alsace. – **They** all retain the name of Blair *and* have been allied by marriage with the most considerable families in France, viz the de Gesvres, de la Rochefoucault, Viscount de Aigremont, Baron de Novailles, The Counts de Champignelle, de Brimont, des Gilbert, de Jolly, des Fleury, etc."

Monsr. Dommartin will thus see that the Scottish genealogist concurs with the officers who drew up the Lettres of Noblesse except in one particular that Douglas the authority above quoted who drew up the account from family papers calls the Emigrant who settled the French Blair in France by the name of Thomas whereas the Lettres de Noblesse give him another name Alexander I think .

– **It** is impossible to decide which is the right name without a search into the family papers which I have no access to if I had leisure for such an investigation. Your correspondent may be assured that the Blairs of Balthayock have always been a distinguished House of great antiquity. Both families of Blair have now passed into the female branch of Blair of Blair, represented by a younger branch of Scott of Mallenie by which transition you and I at least will not allow that they have diminished their Gentry.

As for Blair of Balthayock, I observe Margaret an Heiress succeeded to the estate in 1723 married David Drummond who assumed. Their Son John Blair married Patricia Stephens who survived Him. They had a son David who was an officer. I should be able to say something about the present condition of the family being in indescribable manner cousin of the Blairs of Balthayock.

We always visited, wore mourning for each other intimate births and deaths as the custom amongst Scotch cousins but since my poor Mother's death these things have been forgotten and I do not know the present state of the Balthayock family. The ancient inheritance is beautifully seated on the Tay

near Perth.

If Monsr. Dommartin should wish to know the existing state of the family nothing could be easier for me than to satisfy him. I need not say my dear friend how happy I am to obey your [wishes] on all occasions. Being with the most sincere regard and affection your very faithful kinsman and obedient servant,

Lord Iain Alexander Douglas - Blair Cochrane, is the direct lineal descendent of ALEXANDER BLAIR, born at Blair Ayr 1585.

Alexander Blair was the younger brother of John Blair of Blair born 1574 at Blair, and the son of John Blair of Blair born 1547 and Grizel S e m p i l l his wife. Alexander Blair married Elizabeth Cochrane, and as a consequence of the marriage assumed the surname of Cochrane.

Each generation descending from Alexander Blair has kept the name of Blair just before the surname Cochrane.
